## THE MASTER'S MESSAGE

### “The Badge of a Mason”



A badge comes in many forms and shapes. Badges are symbols of a position or accomplishment. A police officer's badge identifies the wearer as a person who has authority to enforce the laws that we, as a society live by. A firefighter's badge identifies the wearer as a person who has authority to take charge of fire and rescue operations. The flash or badge that is affixed on the front of a Special Forces Green Beret identifies that person as one who has gone through the rigors of the military training necessary to earn the honor of being called a "Green Beret".

We as Free and Accepted Masons also have a badge that we wear with pride and honor. It is the lamb-skin or white leathern apron. It is a confirmation that we have been initiated an Entered Apprentice, passed to the Degree of Fellowcraft, and then Raised to the Sublime Degree of Master Mason. It is a sign of the work and dedication we have invested to learn about this world wide fraternity that we call Freemasonry.

But our aprons stand for more than the work it takes to receive it. We receive our aprons early in our Masonic Journey and as with our law enforcement officers, firefighters, and military officers we must constantly and continually work to earn the distinction and respect that comes with a Mason's Apron. In short, earning the honor and respect to wear our Badge is ever ongoing.

This means that we must be ever on our guard against dishonorable words and actions. We must be careful how we are perceived in public and we do this by not cursing on the highway at other drivers, controlling our tempers around our family members, and perhaps carefully wording what we write on our blogs and the internet.

We must be ready to help or render aid to any person who needs it, especially if that person is a member of a Masonic Family. That is our obligation to society and to each other as Masons. Should we not be on our constant guard and then commit a dishonorable action, or should we fail to help someone in need, then we will have stained; even dishonored our badge.

Let's always remember and ever keep in our minds that Masonry is more than meeting at lodge, or planning and attending fun events. Brotherly love, charity, relief, truth, and honor, are but a few of the tenets that our Trestleboard; the Holy Writings teach us to practice as Masons.

When it is time for us to arrive at that house not made with hands, let us have practiced the beauties of brotherly love, relief, and truth; arriving at the door with our apron, or rather our badge, unstained.

## ON THE LEVEL

This month's article again refers back to the question, "How do we meet?", with the obvious answer being, "On the Level"; but to the novice observer, this may bring about more questions than answering the original question. For instance, someone new to Masonry may ask, "So which level are you?" and/or "How many levels are there?" You might laugh, but I've actually heard those questions myself. As a matter of fact, those questions were also followed up with, "Are there 32 levels? Is that what that the "32" means? Which level are the Shriners on? How many levels would I have to go through to be the Grand Poobah? Is the RAM associated with that goat everyone keeps telling me about?" There are more, but those are the classics I've been exposed to.

Addressing our newly made Masons, you may have pondered some of these questions yourself. If you have, I need to clarify something for you, the Scottish Rite, the York Rite, the Ancient Arabic Order, Nobles of the Mystic Shrine (also known as, the Shriners), the Order of Eastern Star, and many, many, many other organizations are considered Appendant Bodies – not levels of Masonry. As a Master Mason, you have achieved the highest attainable degree in Freemasonry. You may join any of the Appendant Bodies, and you are then addressed according to that body. For instance, if you join the Scottish Rite, you are considered a 32 degree Scottish Rite Mason. If you continue through the York Rite, you will have many titles, among them Royal Arch Mason. The Shrine, a Shriner; and so forth.

That being said, one of the questions asked above is the reason I wrote this article. "How many levels are there?" If you think about it, there are MANY levels of Freemasonry for the newly made Mason. Whether it's to make new friends, to join our great craft for its philanthropic work, or to be the next "Grand Poobah", the best thing about our wonderful fraternity is that it has something for everyone. Through my years I've seen men join the Masonry simply because one of their friends had joined, so then they wanted to join as well. I've seen men join so they can become a member of one of the Appendant Bodies. I've even seen men join because their son or daughter has had so much fun in one of the youth groups associated with Masonry that they themselves wanted to be part of all the fun. My favorite however, is the Brother who joins for....let's say the reasons I stated previously, however, once they became a member, they began to discover all of the rich history and research associated with Masonry. That's right, I said "research"; mysteries that remain unsolved, puzzles that need to be put together, codes that need to be broken....ooohhhh! The opportunities for the newly made Master Mason are bountiful. How deep, or to which level you want to take your Masonic journey is completely up to you.
